If your life goal is to become a substance abuse counselor in Michigan, you've chosen an excellent profession. The need for counselors is growing rapidly because of less stigma for those seeking help for addiction, more counseling options for those jailed for drug offenses, and more state programs designed to actively combat addiction. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the sector is forecast to continue growing at a healthy 16% over the next decade, far higher than national projections for all jobs. The majority of substance abuse counselors in Michigan work in outpatient care centers, followed by personal and family services. The state's median annual wage is \$43,390, which is the national average. The top 10% of average annual wages are \$70,840, significantly higher than the national median of \$63,620. Coupled with the low cost of living in the state, you can enjoy a healthy income when you reach the top tier of the profession. Michigan doesn't require a low-accredited degree, but education requirements are strict, so it's a good idea to make a master's degree a long-term goal. Substance abuse counselor licenses are overseen by the Michigan Board of Addiction Specialist Accreditation (MCCAP), a division of the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services. There are two types of qualifications available: Certified Alcohol and Drug Counselor (CADC) and Certified Higher Alcohol Drug Counselor (CAADC). In addition, you are qualified for properly titled clinical supervision with a Certified Clinical Supervisor (CCS). Specific education, experience, and training are required to apply to test each credential. Only CAADC requires the degree to which cadc requires the education it needs, but it needs to plan accordingly. Before enrolling, we will make sure that the requirements include coursework for the selected program and plan to move to a master's program in the future. Michigan must account for both work experience and supervision, a term that MCCAP uses to indicate job training hours. Each must meet certain criteria to qualify for the certification exam. Apply to sit the exam using MCCAP. Once the application is accepted, the test will be conducted by the International Certification and Mutual Consortium/Advanced Alcohol and Drug Counselor (IC&RC/AADC). Once certified, you must renew your certificate regularly and take continuing education coursework in the mean time. The remaining 120 hours must be related to either substance use or the IC&RC/ADC performance domain: professional and ethical responsibility screening of counseling, evaluation, engagement treatment planning, collaboration, referral minimum 6 hours must be MCCAP approved coursework in the practical ethics of behavioral medical professionals. The required experience is directly based on the degree to which you have earned: associate degree 1,000 hours credit bachelor's degree 2,000 hours credit master's degree or more and 4,000 hours credit supervision: supervision is a term used in Michigan for clinically supervised training. Cadc requires 300 hours in 100-hour increments if you hold a bachelor's degree or higher. The supervisor must use a minimum of 10 hours for each domain for the IC&RC/ADC performance domain described above. You need to earn a master's degree or higher in addiction science, counseling, marriage and family therapy, psychiatric nursing, psychology, or social work with clinical applications. The 180 hours of the master's program are specific to substance use disorders and must be related to six professional ethics. Coursework in treatment methods and clinical theories is not counted if they are not specific to SUD. In addition, your education should be a topic in the IC&RC AADC domain as well as the keyword course title topic above: Alcohol Chemical Dependent Symbiotic Disorder Substance Abuse Substance Abuse Disorder Tobacco will require 2,000 hours of postmaster degree clinical counseling experience in cooperation with drug abuse disorder clients or co-occurrence disorder clients. CCDP) Certified Co-Occurrence Failure Professional (CCDP) Certified Co-Occurrence Disorder Diplomat (CCDP-D) 30 Clinical Supervision Contact Time (CCDP-D) Includes 4 hours in each of the following CCS domains: Counselor Development Performance Assessment and Management Professional & Ethical Standards Program& Quality Assurance As mentioned above, 10,000 hours of clinical counseling in a state licensed program or MCCAP-approved alternative, including 200 hours of direct supervision of 4,000 hours of clinical supervision experience specific to the IC&RC/CCS performance domain, does not require a degree for CADC testing, but requires a significant degree of formal education. You need a master's degree from CAADC, so you need to make this degree a long-term goal and plan your education accordingly. Your first concern before enrollment is to make sure that the school you choose is an MCCAP approved provider. Next, you need to make sure that the program you choose includes the required coursework mentioned above. A bachelor's degree is only 120 hours, so completing the 300 hours of coursework required for CADC can be the first step towards certification. You can then complete the master's program requirements within a year or two. If your internship is part of an educational program, make sure it qualifies as a work experience. You should also make sure that your CCS is in place for paid or any work completed as part of the class. Two types of certifications are allowed in the United States. Institutional and professional. Agency accreditation takes into account the entire institution while focusing professionally on professional preparation programs. The Council for the Accreditation of Counseling and Related Education Programs (CACREP) is a professional certification focused on master's and doctorate programs in counseling at universities around the world. Only institutions that have already been certified are subject to CACREP review. The certification review will focus on programs that offer graduate degrees in counseling. Select the CACREP Certification Program to meet the highest quality standards. Many counseling specialties are certified by CACREP, including addiction counseling. The Certified Addiction Counseling Program prepares individuals to work with people affected by addictive behaviors and their families. Addictive behaviors include alcohol, drugs, food, gambling, sex, and other things that negatively affect your personal or work life by creating addiction behaviors. The CACREP certification program will focus on treatment models and stages of addiction, including prevention, recovery, and recurrence prevention. These 60-semester time programs include the application of interventions. When students choose the CACREP certification program, they can be confident that the program will focus on or exceed professional counseling rather than psychology or education. You can download the documents required to apply for the test via the MCCAP website and must submit the following documents and an application fee of \$175: document the educational form for undocumented event testing, academic equivalents, signed code of ethics code IC&RC/ADC to receive notification of approval in 4 to 6 weeks. You must pass international certification and a mutual consortium/alcohol/drug counselor's written exam before you can be certified. Clinical supervision is an area of substance abuse certification that helps others qualify for them in the field. CSS is responsible for a wide range of other supervisory roles, including mentoring, evaluation, and guidance, and verifying that supervisors obtain documented informed consent from clients as needed. At least half of these times must be substance use failure (SUD) and the rest must be related to the AADC performance domain. You will not be able to take the same course twice in a 12-month period. Up to 50% of continuing education can be met through the following options: Education: Up to 12 contact times for teaching approved class publishing in professional journals: Publishing more than 4,000 words in a specialized journal is equivalent to 12 contact hours presenting SUD-related papers. At state or national conferences specifically related to the field of substance abuse counseling, 12 contact hours of addiction counselor alcohol and drug addiction counselor health professional certified addiction drug and alcoholism counselor mental health counselor school counselor substance abuse counselor, when beginning the path to substance abuse certification, As soon as you enter your chosen school, you plan to join one or more specialized institutions.
